The U.S. Army Child & Youth Services' Babysitter Program enhances Soldiers' sense of well-being in the field, by providing a common, Army-supported service during school-out hours to take care of his/her child at home. Further, the standardized Babysitting Program incorporates local youths from military families to enhance the sense of community among garrisons and build important life skills for future leaders.

1 Local youth are able to increase their community involvement through the Babysitter Program, assisting parents in need of trained childcare professionals.

2 The Babysitter Program offers a standard training curriculum for one-time, universal endorsement across the Army's worldwide installations.

3 The Babysitter Program reduces distractions in the field by providing Soldiers with a secure family environment.

4 The Babysitter Program supports military families by providing quality care for their children during out-of-school time.

5 The Babysitter Program provides a common learning environment and development track for military teens that move often due to reassignments.

6 Babysitters in the program are trained to provide age-appropriate care and resolve any potentially dangerous situations.

7 The Babysitter Program offers a short-term childcare solution for military families that need supplemental support at home.
