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Equine Herpesvirus (EHV-1) Update

A Guide To Understanding the Neurologic Form of EHV Infection

Equine Herpes Virus (EHV-1) infection in horses can cause respiratory disease, abortion in mares, neonatal foal death, and/or neurologic disease. The neurologic form of EHV-1 is called Equine Herpes Virus Myeloencephalopathy (EHM). The neurological signs appear as a result of blood vessels in the brain and spinal cord associated by the infection. This causes tissue damage and a subsequent loss in the normal function of areas in the brain and spinal cord.

What are the equine herpesviruses? To date there are several nine EHV's that have been identified world wide. The three that are causing the most serious health risks are EHV-1, EHV-3 and EHV-4 and can have significant impact on the U.S. equine industry.

How common are EVH-1 infections? Normally, by the age of two years old, almost all horses have been infected with EHV-1. Foals are normally exposed through contact with their dams at a young age. It can become inactive in the horse's body, that sets it up in a carrier state that is life-long. The horses that are carriers of the virus do not show any external signs when the disease is in a latent form. During times of stress, such as strenuous, long-distance transport, or at weaning.

Why should I be concerned about EHV-1? There has been a recent increase in the number of EHV-1 cases reported in the United States. The most recent being identified at a recent competing in the National Cutting Horse Association Western National Championship in Ogden, Utah, held April 29-May 8, have been diagnosed with EHV-1. Reports of affected horses have been received from multiple States and Western Canada, with several fatalities.

Horse owners and other individuals with questions or concerns regarding EHV-1 should contact their local equine veterinarian. Equine veterinarians with suspect cases of EHV-1 should contact their State Animal Health Officials.

How is the virus spread? The most common way that the virus is spread is by direct horse-to-horse contact. It is though the respiratory tract or through direct or indirect contact with an infected with an aborted fetus. It can be spread indirectly though contact of physical objects contaminated with infectious virus. Some examples of such objects include:

- Tack
- Wipe rags or other grooming equipment,
- Feed and water buckets, and
- People's hands or clothing

The air around an infected horse that is sheading can also be contaminated with the infected virus. It is difficult to establish the distance the virus can spread in this manner.

When should I suspect my horse might have EHM? Sign of EHM include:

- Fever preceding neurologic signs (horse diagnosed or exposed to a infected horse),
- Decreased coordination,
- Urine dribbling,
- Loss of tail tone,
- Hind link weakness, Leaning against a wall or fence to maintain balance,
- Lethargy, and Inability to rise.

EHV-1 Continued

How is the disease diagnosed? Diagnostics your veterinarian might perform for a live horse include:

- Nasal swab collection for laboratory examination and detection of virus by polymerase chain reaction (PCR) assay or by virus isolation; and
- Blood collection to detect the virus by PCR assay or by virus isolation. Blood samples should be collected 2 to 3 weeks apart for levels of antibodies specific to EHV-1.

Ideally, your veterinarian will collect both nasal swab and blood samples to optimize arriving at a diagnosis.

Diagnostics your veterinarian might perform for a deceased horse include:

- Necropsy provides an important means of confirming the presence of EHV-1 disease.

Is there a treatment for EHM? The standard form of care for EHM is primarily supportive. Treatments may include intravenous fluids or anti-inflammatory drugs. Antibiotics may be used to treat a secondary bacterial infection if one develops; however, antibiotics have no effect on the equine herpesvirus itself. Antiviral drugs have also been used to treat EHM cases. Research on the efficacy of these drugs, their cost effectiveness, and the optimal dosing regimen for EHM is still

How can I prevent EHV-1, from spreading to other horses? There are many steps you can take to help prevent the spread of EHV-1.

- Stop horse movement if your animals may be infected with EHV-1. This is the most important first step horse owners can take.
- Do not allow horses exposed to EHM case(s) to have contact with unexposed horses on the premises.
- Isolate sick horses. Horses that have aborted or shown signs of fever, respiratory disease, or neurologic disease should be separated from healthy horses. Ideally, the sick horse(s) should be moved into a separate building or be transported to a veterinary hospital with an isolated facility.
- Do not share equipment among horses at a facility since the virus can be spread via contaminated equipment.
- Practice proper biosecurity measures to prevent people from spreading the virus. Since people can transfer this virus from horse to horse via their hands and clothing, good sanitary conditions, changing their clothes and footwear after working with a sick horse. Wearing gloves and using disinfectant to sanitize footwear can also help minimize the risk of people spreading the virus.

Acadiana District Horse Show

Health papers will be checked at District Show in west end of Sugarena. Your health papers issue date must be good through the State Show (within 60 days). They will be randomly selected to be checked in Monroe at the State Show. Horses must be present at the time of check-in. Check-in will be conducted on Thursday—Saturday of each day. Please check schedule to verify times. The health officials will verify chips or permit markings on horses. Please refer to the schedule for check-in times.

Once the state inspectors check your health papers and Coggins, while verifying the chip number to the horse (**horse must be present**) then you will be given a "Health Paper Check Slip". This slip will allow you to proceed into the "registration table" to complete your registration. Please check the posting boards near the concession stand to verify the classes that you have entered. To speed up the entry process, the following will be needed:

- A. A list of the classes (class name and number) that the horse is entered will speed up check in.
- B. Official health papers issued no longer than 60 days prior to the show, issued by an accredited veterinarian, asserting that the animals are showing no evidence of infectious, contagious, or parasitic disease and are apparently healthy and have met all the specific requirements of this regulation.
- C. A negative test for equine infectious anemia (Coggins Test) performed within the past 12 months (see page 76 of your show catalog).
- D. Registration papers/grade horse certificates/forms indicating immediate family ownership if necessary. If a copy of this paperwork was submitted in advance and is in order, the paperwork will not need to be rechecked. However, exhibitors are required to bring all paperwork with them at the time of check-in, in case it is needed.

All above mentioned paperwork will be **checked during check-in time only** prior to the district shows. Please come to the show with paperwork in hand during check-in time as indicated. Please refer to the Hub-City Equine Newsletter dated May for the district show schedule.

Stalls and shavings will be available upon your arrival at Sugarena. Your cooperation, willingness to work with others, understanding for others, and patience is appreciated.

If you have not already requested a stall from Sugarena, you may request one by contacting Sugarena at Stalls are available at a flat rate of \$20/stall for the entire 3 day event.

The Sugarena is handling all camper/trailer parking and stall rental. Camper parking is available at a rate of \$20/day for 30 amp and \$25/day for 50 amp hookups. Please contact the Sugarena in advance directly (337-365-7539) to make arrangements.

Exhibitors will need to complete a State Show Planning Form and turn it in to Mr. Charles or Ms. Samantha Simmons, prior to leaving the Sugarena.

Health Papers Will be Checked at Random at State Show

Update received Monday, June 13, 2011 from State Horse Specialist—Dr. Neely Heidorn —

Please make all of your 4-Hers and their parents aware that **ALL HORSES ATTENDING THE 2011 4-H STATE HORSE SHOW IN WEST MONROE, LA** will need a **CURRENT Health Certificate** (within 60 days) which will be checked at random. This is in response to the recent outbreak of Equine Herpes Virus-1 (EHV-1) in Ogden, Utah. By increasing out biosecurity measures, hopefully we can continue to prevent this disease from effecting any horses in Louisiana.

State Entry Fee Procedures

All 4-H and FFA Members (and/or parents, guardians, etc.) will be required to pay entry fees and stall fees in the LSU AgCenter Livestock Show Office upon arrival at the State Horse Show. Entry fees are as follows: \$15.00 per class, \$15.00 per stall/Day used, and \$20.00 per cattle class.

Back numbers will not be issued until all fees are paid. Exhibitors will have the same number for District and State, however the numbers for District are **green** and the numbers for State are **red**. Exhibitors must report to the registration desk to pay their fees and pick up their red back number. Exhibitors will not be allowed to use the green numbers from the District Show. Without the red numbers the exhibitors will not be allowed to participate in their respective classes.

Fees may be paid with a personal check, cash, or money order. No credit cards will be accepted. The checks will be made out to the **LSU AgCenter Livestock Show Office**.

Camper request for the state show must be submitted in advance with proper payment. Request must be mailed to the Ike Hamilton Expo Center, 501 Mane St., West Monroe, LA, 71292. Spaces will be assigned on a first come first serve basis. Camper spaces are **\$15 per day**.

All 4-H and FFA exhibitors attending the State Show, no matter the age of the exhibitor, must have **ADULT** supervision. We will assume this to be parents. Any exhibitor who does not have parental supervision must have another adult responsible for the exhibitor while in Monroe. Agents and AG teachers will not be responsible for chaperoning of exhibitors.

All exhibitors attending the State Show are responsible for feeding, watering, and caring for their animals, as well as for cleaning of the area where their animals are stalled, etc. This must be done each morning, prior to 8:00 AM. Exhibitors are also responsible for getting all animals to the show ring on time.

Your Character Does Count!

As we reflect on the past year, we realize that what we do does indeed matter! This year we have focused on the Character Counts program during each month of the 4-H club meetings. The showing character program has three important goals. The first and the most important is to provide an opportunity for young people to develop good character and life skills. In addition, the remaining two goals are to provide exhibitors and their families to expand their knowledge of livestock production and to improve an enhance livestock production.

The Showing Character program contributes to the development of positive character traits in the members that are in the program. It supports six universal pillars of character—trustworthiness, respect, responsibility, fairness, caring and citizenship. This month we will discuss the final component, decision making to tie them all together.

To begin we must start with ethics. What exactly is ethics? Ethics is a standard of conduct that tells how we should behave. It consist of values that guide our choices and actions. Ethics are what we should do. Our character is a reflection of what we do.

Exhibitors, family members and our sponsors know the difference between right and wrong, but better than that they live it. They do the right thing on a regular basis. People that live in this manner, making ethical decisions takes lots of courage. In some cases, you may have to make some decisions that are not popular with your fellow exhibitors, friends, or family. In many cases this can and will cost in terms of winning and loosing, friendships, prestige, pleasure or money, but the reward is in knowing that we have done the is right.

In making decisions, we will involve stakeholders. Who is a stakeholder? A stakeholder is a person, group or an institution affected by a decision.

Throughout our lives, we will make many decisions. Some are made on the spur of the moment, in a split second. We should consider the facts, our feelings, the options and consequences when making decisions. The result of a decision can last a lifetime or even longer. This is why we should utilize some type of procedure when making decisions. The following process can be used in making every decision:

1. Clearly identify the situation.
2. Consider all of the stakeholders.
3. The six universal principles of character outrank and override non-ethical ones.
4. When several core ethical values conflict, choose the one that will produce the most good for the largest number of people.

In much simpler terms in making a decision, before acting on a decision, should consider the following:

- Am I applying the Golden Rule?
- Am I violating any of the six principles of character?
- Would I be proud of my decision if it were published in the paper?
- What if my family finds out?
- How does it make me feel about myself?

Southern Regional Show

The Southern Regional Championship Horse Show will be held in Tunica, Mississippi at the Tunica Mississippi Arena and Expo Center Arena on July 26-31, 2011. Any 4-H member that places in the top 10 of a class should consider completing paperwork for the regional show

The exhibitor and their parents must complete the appropriate entry forms, request stalls and leave a payment for the regional show prior to leaving the state show. Once an exhibitor qualifies in an event, they may enter as many classes as he/she desires at the Southern Regional Show.

You may obtain a packet from the show office with the specifics rules, fees and details for the regional show. Participants that complete the packet prior to departing the state show that are questionable based on your individual placing, will be notified on Tuesday or Wednesday following the show , if you were selected.

Louisiana has been allocated a total of 50 horses to participate in the regional show. The 50 horses will be composed of a halter mare and gelding of each breed (10 horses), 37 horses from performance classes and the next eligible horse selected from the performance class with the largest number of exhibitors.

Master Horseman

The LSU AgCenter is considering conducting a seventh **Master Horseman Program** for adults in the spring of 2012. The Master Horseman Project is designed to improve the overall knowledge and skills of horse people so that they can serve as 4-H leaders. This program consists of eight sessions. Each session will include horse care and management in a classroom setting, and riding and training in an arena. A fee of about \$200.00 will be assessed per participant to defray the cost of the program. This cost will include 18 meals, rope halter, yacht cord, lead rope, vet kits, books, binders, bits and prizes. Program participants are expected to serve as volunteers to help in extension horse programs.

Sessions begin with a meal and review at 5:30 PM, with the class starting at 6 PM. They are the Sugarena in Iberia and the Cecil McCrory Exhibit Bldg. (4-H Show Barn) in Abbeville.

An individual must participate in at least 6 sessions to receive the LSU AgCenter Master Horseman Certificate. The program will be limited to 14 participants. If you would like to get more information or an application, please contact Charles Hebert or Samantha Simmons at 291-7090.

SPECIAL NOTE: The Acadiana District Horse Show would like to thank the Sugarena for agreeing to host and co-sponsor the 2011 show at their facility. Check-in procedure for this year's show will be handled in the same manner as last year. Please see instructions below:

"ONLY" those exhibitors with horses entered in Team Penning must check in between 7:00 AM and 8:00 AM on Thursday, July 1. Exhibitors entered in all other classes will check in according to the following procedure during the designated time on the designated day they come to the show.

Upon arrival to the show grounds, horses must **first report to the health paper check station** located on the west end of the Sugarena. Inspectors from the La. Dept. of Agriculture will check health papers and and Coggins test for each horse. All paperwork **must be current through the State Show**; and therefore, will not be checked again upon arrival in Monroe. After paperwork is checked, a blue health slip will be issued for each horse.

Exhibitors must **then report to the official check-in area** with their blue slip (and other paperwork if necessary) to officially check in. This will include:

- * Checking the horse into or scratching out of each class.
- * Picking up exhibitor back numbers for each horse.
- * Checking in registration papers/grade horse certificates/forms indicating immediate family ownership if this paperwork was not submitted in advance.
- * Checking in the blue health slip. (Anyone reporting to the office without their blue health slip will be allowed to check in, but will not be issued a back number or allowed to show until they return to the office to check-in the blue health slip).

Horses will be required to go through the check-in process only once and check-in will be allowed only during the designated time each day. Exhibitors in close proximity to the Sugarena are encouraged to check in on Thursday to avoid congestion problems on Friday and Saturday.
