We Don't Like Lichens

Although we like most things green, particularly on our plants, we don't like lichens. Lichens (pronounced like in) are combinations of an alga, fungi, or bacteria in a mutually beneficial relationship. They are often found growing on rocks, plants and other non-mobile objects. Although harmless, not taking nutrients from plants, they do indicate some stress on the plants.

Lichens are not pathogens, meaning they don't cause disease in plants. They use the plants as a surface to grow on. When a tree or shrub begins to decline due to some sort of environmental stress or other disorder, its leaf canopy will thin and allow sunlight to enter and support lichen growth. If overall plant health is improved, a dense, vibrant leaf canopy should inhibit any sunlight available for lichen.

The two most common causes of stress on trees and shrubs are injury to the plant by string trimmers and poorly drained soil. Other reasons include herbicide damage, poor plant quality and planting technique, such as failure to remove plant ties and tags that girdle branches.

Lichens are a clue that something is wrong causing the plants to grow slowly and decline in health. This could be a combination of factors like plant competition, draught stress, root stress, overwatering, soil compaction, poor nutrition, or improper pH. If you remove whatever is stressing your plants, the lichen will go away.

The plant show is over. It is the end of the month and my system has finally acclimated to daylight savings. These are the spring warm up exercises for the serious business of planting the veggie garden at my house. 6:00 am signals the beginning of the gardening day. The raccoons waiting under their umbrella need breakfast before going to bed. Occasionally, they bring possum friends. The birds are better than any alarm at letting you know when daylight arrives. Their platform feeder is swarmed at first light. I have a pleasant traffic jam going down the driveway to the garden. A pair of swallowtail kites patrol the length of the driveway overhead. The fairies did not come and finish the weeding last night so I put on my armor (gloves, sunscreen, sunglasses, and iPod shuffle), and to a chorus of crows, grackles, and cows I begin the task I love so well, veggie gardening!!!!

Master Gardener Meeting
March 16, 2011

A meeting of the Master Gardener Association was held on Wednesday, March 16, 2011 at the National Guard Armory. A quorum was present with 64 members attending.

Julie Deus called the meeting to order at 10:00 AM. Julie led the pledge of allegiance and Rusty Batty led the group in prayer.

Judy Wood offered the garden hint of the month: the use of full strength household ammonia (in a spray bottle) for use on insect or ant bites. White vinegar or meat tenderizer can also be effective in treating bites.

Vince Accardo's "hot topic" was on the need to harden off plants in order to have success with new plantings.

Judy Wood introduced Georgeann Chaffee who offered a lovely presentation on "Assessing the Mature Landscape". An overview and spreadsheet of the program has been attached to the minutes.

There was a brief break at 10:45 and the meeting resumed at 11:05 AM.

Rusty reported on the following:

- MG's are asked to sign-out for yard signs to advertise the Plant Sale

- Directories are available in the Ag Center office

- MG recommitment/reactivation form is available in the Ag Center office

- Pam Twardzik/Judy Wood/Sandy Arnoult can assist with reactivation and setting up an account

- There is a sign-up list for the May 13 MG Appreciation Day, a head count is needed

- The Plant Show is an opportunity to offer information to the public and to generate funds for the scholarship fund; March 31 is the deadline for the scholarship applications

- The budget is not as threatening but still undecided on the federal level

- The Plant Show is the major project of the association – everyone is encouraged to participate

- Asked for help in the Ag Center office – contact Penelope Gilles or Mary Beth if you can assist

Julie asked the the Minutes of the February meeting be approved as presented.

A Motion was offered by Donna Dicharry to accept the Minutes of the February meeting as presented. Motion carried.

Julie reported the following:

- A sign has been posted which lists volunteer hours – available to monitor service hours

- Several MG's participated in the Madisonville Garden Show/Sale

- Debora Litzenberger's husband, Ken, has been honored as Refuge Manager of the Year by the National Wildlife Refuge Association.

Judy Wood reported on:

A comment/suggestion bucket was available

Field Trip to Mobile bus leaves at 6:30 AM from Covington; 7:00 AM from Slidell and returns at 3 PM after the herb speaker; there are two openings for Master Gardeners

Next month is the plant swap – no meeting, no speaker and after the swap, there will be a picnic at the home of Karla Partridge (info/directions will be in the Gardengoer). Karla asked that everyone bring a dish, a chair and a shovel (she has plants in her garden that she will give away)

The May 18 meeting is the “scholarship” meeting; Art Scott will present on Edible Flowers; there will be no hint, hot topic nor sharing table

June 15 – Veggie Festival – there is a sign-up sheet to plan/organize this event; there will be some tomato tastings but no prizes

July 20 – Nancy Bartlett will speak on cut flowers and a tour of her farm will follow the meeting

August 17 – John Besh at LaProvence after the 10 AM regular meeting; 11:45 tour of his garden with a presentation and lunch to follow. Judy proposed that the \$45 cost be divided that MG’s pay \$35 per person and the Association would pay \$10 per person. There is a maximum of 80 people – MG’s only unless space is available. Guests would pay \$45 per person.

Judy asked for a motion to approve the cost division as proposed.

A Motion was offered by Kappy Goodwin to approve the \$45 per person cost for the August 17 program with John Besh at LaProvence to be split as follows: \$35 per person to be paid by the Master Gardener and \$10 per person to be paid by the Association. Motion carried.

November 16 – Patrick O’Connor, Louisiana iris “guru” coming from NO to speak

September – working on organic vegetable gardening

October – working on “drainage” presentation

Rusty reported on the status of the Plant Sale preparations. Asked MG’s not to make purchases on Friday afternoon or Saturday morning in order that vendors would have adequate stock for sale to the general public.

Jay Rose presented the Treasurer’s Report (a copy has been attached to the minutes).

Julie asked for approval of the Treasurer’s Report as presented.

A Motion was offered by Dennis Koepp to accept the Treasurer’s Report as presented to the members. Motion carried.

Susie Andres reported that Tuesday, March 22 would be the planning day for the Lacombe Butterfly Garden and that April 8 is the date to plant.

June Taffaro reported on the Slidell Herb Fest, Tuesday, April 12 from 4 – 7 PM at the Slidell Library. Offerings will include herbal food and tea, container herb gar-

dening, three speakers, children's booth, door prizes. The wrap-up meeting will be March 30th from 1-3 PM at the Slidell Library. Volunteers are needed to set-up, work and take down. More information will be in the Gardengoer.

Cecelia Drennan offered a proposal for MG's to partner with Keep Slidell Beautiful to work on a landscaping project at the Slidell Senior Center (the project description has been attached to the minutes). It is a three phase project to increase knowledge by forming a senior citizens green team. There would be no cost to the MG's. Cecelia asked for approval for MG's to participate in the project.

A Motion was offered by Nancy Berulis to approve participation in the partnership project between the Master Gardeners and Keep Slidell Beautiful to landscape the Slidell Senior Citizens Center in a three phase project which will be at no cost to the Association. Motion carried.

Julie discussed a proposal to expand the membership directory to include special interest areas and professional background. Pam Twardzik will gather information, put the information on a disk and distribute it to the membership. Participation is voluntary, not mandatory.

Julie also discussed the idea of a speakers bureau which would assist Rusty. Pam Keating has a sign-up sheet for MG's who are interested in speaking on areas of their expertise. More information will be forthcoming.

Judy Wood proposed that the Association sell Palm Flex Atlas gloves (New Orleans and Hammond sell gloves at their events) which can be purchased in a quantity of 144 (S/M/L) for \$2.99 each. The gloves retail for \$6/pair. Judy proposed that we sell them at \$5/pair for MG sanctioned events and \$4/pair at non-Master Gardener events. Judy requested approval to sell the gloves.

A Motion was offered by Tom Cuccia to allow the sale of Palm Flex gloves at Master Gardener events. Motion carried.

Donna Howland reported that the Food Bank Project has begun with six MG's participating. Fliers went out last week and there are four participants to date. The class dates are March 28 and April 7. Another meeting will be held next week.

Betty Rose announced a Secret Garden Tour on April 10 from 1-6 PM, \$15 in advance and \$20 on Sunday. The tour will be in Slidell and Betty has tickets.

Julie announced that the next Board Meeting would be March 31 at 5:00 PM at the Louisiana Heart Hospital.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:05 PM.

Lacombe Butterfly Garden

April 1, 2011 Report

Members of the Butterfly Garden committee met on March 22, 2011 to view the garden and make plans for the 2011 garden. Thanks to the great work done by the 2010 committee many of the butterfly magnets (plants) put in during the 2010 season have come back for 2011. Salvia, butterfly bush, gladiolas, turk's cap, fennel, heirloom mums and lantana made it through the winter and are sprouting up nicely.

We will have a Butterfly Garden work day on Friday, April 8 beginning at 8:30. At this time we will rake out the old mulch, plant pentas, passion vine, parsley, and some annuals for color. An irrigation system will be installed, and new mulch will be spread across the garden. The committee decided that we need to maintain a consistent water source for butterflies visiting the garden, so we'll add a shallow water container for our winged visitors.

The Friends of Louisiana Wildlife Refuges has agreed to donate up to \$300 for the 2011 butterfly garden.

All are welcome to join in the April 8 planting party/work day. If you plan to come or need more information please contact me. If you can't come to the work day make plans to visit the garden. It is located on the grounds of the Bayou Lacombe Centre, off of Highway 434 in Lacombe. A kiosk located at the main parking area displays a map of the grounds. The butterfly garden is located near the camellia gardens, just behind the Law Enforcement building. The refuge is open for visitors from 9:00 AM – 4:00 PM every Monday – Saturday.






STMG Association Board Meeting
March 31, 2011

A meeting of the Board of Directors of the St. Tammany Master Gardener Association was held on Thursday, March 31, 2011 at 5:00 PM at the Louisiana Heart Hospital in Lacombe. Board Members attending were Julie Deus, Judy Wood, Jay Rose and Chere Currault.

Jay presented the Treasurer's Report (attached to the minutes) reflecting balances of \$2,320.12 in the Association account, \$17,787.26 in the Plant Show account and \$5,005.99 in the Savings account. Jay proposed that \$7,786 be transferred to the Association savings account and the balance of \$10,000 to remain in the Plant Show Account.

A Motion was offered by Judy Wood and seconded by Chere Currault to move \$7,786 to the Association Savings Account and the balance of \$10,000 will be left in the Plant Show Account. Motion carried.

Judy provided the evaluation of the field trip to Mobile which has been attached to the minutes. Judy gave an update on the forthcoming meetings and speakers and noted the change from a buffet style lunch to a set menu for the John Besh presentation in August. Checks to secure reservations will be accepted at the regular June meeting. On August 1st, any available spaces will be open to guests at a cost of \$45 per person.

Judy stated there were two suggestions from the last meeting: a request for a speaker on "canning"; and that checks submitted for activities are acknowledged.

Under New Projects, Judy read the proposed protocol for the sale of garden gloves (copy attached to the minutes). Judy suggested the possibility of using a portion of the profits, if any, to support a selected project.

A Motion was offered by Judy Wood and seconded by Jay Rose to adopt the Protocol for the sale of garden gloves by the Association. Motion carried.

Julie stated that ten master gardeners signed up for the Speakers Bureau and that a notice will be published in the Gardengoer for any other master gardeners interested in joining the group. Christy Paulsell reported on the MG's partnership with the STPSB Schools and stated there would be funding provided by Jinx Vidrine's private foundation for the Legacy School Gardens which targets 20 of 27 grades Pre-K to 3 schools with one Legacy Garden per school. A request will be made for MG's to attend the Professional Development days in July. The project would not require any financial support from the STMG Association. Additional information will be published in the Gardengoer.

Betty Rose gave an update on the Herb Festival, April 12 from 4 – 7 PM. The set up will be at 1:30 PM and Rusty will provide the PA system. Friday, April 15 is the wrap-up meeting.

Julie reported that the Lacombe Butterfly Garden will have a planting work day on April 8th and that Jay, Art Scott and Keith Knight would install an irrigation system. Financial sponsors are in place.

The MG recommitment process was discussed with clarification from Rusty that the MG must first meet the criteria, pay dues, open an account and then sign the commitment form. Once this process is complete, information will be submitted to Pam Keating for e-mail distribution to the membership.

Debora Litzenberger asked that articles/information for the Gardengoer which are typically submitted to Pam Keating, be sent directly to Debora while Pam is recovering from surgery. The meeting was adjourned at 6:00 PM.
