Frost, Freeze, Frozen or Forget it  
Pruning Damaged plants

In January we had some unusually cold weather for South Louisiana. After nearly 6 days of below 32° and at least 3 days in the teens, we are ready for some milder winter weather. But hold on, old man winter is not through just yet. It's not uncommon for February to provide many more days of frost freeze and frozen plants. Our average last frost date is mid March.

These recent freezes have had an effect on our plants but it's a little early to severely prune or "cut it all down." Additionally, many plants weren't damaged, like trees, shrubs, ground cover and lawns. In any case no pruning of plants should be done till 7 to 10 days after a freeze. It usually takes several days for all the damage to become evident.

Other general tips on what to do following the freeze.

- For herbaceous / non woody plants (Cannas, elephant ears, begonias, impatiens and ginger) - prune away to living tissue. If it is mushy, slimy or smells, remove it.
- For woody plants (schefflera, hibiscus, angel trumpet, crotons, tibouchina) - use the thumbnail to check for green tissue.
- Move container plants back outside
- Uncover any covered plants so they can get sunlight
- Mulch over Amaryllises, crinum, irises and other bulb plantings
- Prune only what needs pruning, cut out the damaged part, and leave the living parts.

Keep in mind, the frost or freeze may have caused frozen plant damage that is beyond repair. That part of the landscape may be beyond recovery. For those plants, forget it and plant for the future.



## *Ditch Witchery*

Often when I am stopped in traffic, (which is often!), I make a point of turning my gaze towards the natural beauty that lines the roads and byways. The yellows of Golden Rod and the lavender of Aster swaying just a few yards away soothes my growing road rage and reminds me why living in St. Tammany Parish is such a blessing. The ever changing landscape, exhibiting wild flowers blooming one day that were not just the day before, never ceases refresh and renew me.

In was in this frame of mind, that I excitedly attended the Ditch Witchery floral workshop hosted by the Flower Altar Guild at Christ Church in Covington. The title alone was enough to satisfy me but when I arrived and saw buckets full of various “ditch” flowers, plants, and okay, what some may even call weeds; and at least 30 women who apparently shared my love for road beauty, I was in heaven.



New Orleans freelance florists, Meade Wenzel and Keeth Buckley, brought *oohs* and *aaahs* as they created one gorgeous arrangement after another in only a matter of a few minutes.

For her first display, Meade stuffed Magnolia leaves into a small inexpensive plastic pot to be used as the frog for the display. She placed the pot into a larger, attractive ceramic pot. Meade, stating she prefers water as a basic element in all her displays, poured water into the two pots to assist with preservation. Picking random Magnolia, Ligustrum and Nandina branches, she explained how she allows the shape of the foliage dictate the flow of the display. Each arrangement that followed was more impressive than the last; and that they were created so effortlessly, was inspiring.



The following week as I walked my dog around our subdivision pond, the easiest access I have to native flora, I gathered whatever caught my eye. I came home with a handful of Golden Rod, Aster, Trumpet Vine flowers and pods, wild blackberries and a few sticks. Just as Meade and Keeth demonstrated, I let the plants decide where they wanted to go. In just over 15 minutes, I had an arrangement that I proudly presented to my dinner hosts that evening receiving my very own *oohs* and *aaahs*. I encourage all fellow “ditch flower” fans to jump right in and see what you can create with the natural beauty that surrounds us.

## LMG2010 Conference Overview

The annual state conference for the Louisiana Master Gardeners will be held in West Monroe from April 29-May 1, 2010, at the West Monroe Convention Center. Every adventure “*Through the Garden Gate*” offers new experiences that sustain the desires for more knowledge and stimulation from the world of gardening. The 2010 conference will address a wide array of interests, leaving everyone excited about continuing their journey “*Through the Garden Gate*.”

The conference is sponsored by the Northeast Louisiana and North Central Louisiana Master Gardener associations.

Our panel of instructors and speakers will include national, regional and local specialists on topics ranging from companion plantings, plant propagation, urban wildlife, native plants, hands-on projects, gardening history, wine making and much more. The conference will consist of five breakout sessions, each consisting of four classroom educational programs and one hands-on demonstration. Complementing the sessions will be our keynote speakers: **Joe Lamp’l**, host of two national television shows: GardenSMART on PBS and DIY Network’s Fresh from the Garden; **Dan Gill**, LSU AgCenter horticulturist, author and media personality; **Jenny Rose Carey**, director of the Landscape Arboretum on the Temple University Ambler Campus and adjunct professor in the Department of Landscape Architecture and Horticulture.

The conference will also offer educational displays, garden products and plant vendors, two socials, a silent auction, Master Gardener store and an opportunity to visit the Biedenharn Museum and Gardens and the Biedenharn Coca-Cola Museum. The ELSong garden is referred to as “Best Garden You’ve Never Heard of” by *Southern Living*, July 2009. 


## Slidell Library Herb Demonstration Garden
