Beware of the Tropical Sod Webworm

Sightings of hundreds of moths over lawns have been a concern for area homeowners recently. These moths, although not a danger themselves, are laying eggs that will develop caterpillar offspring. The caterpillars are Tropical Sod Webworm. These caterpillars can ravage a lawn in short order.

Moths lay their eggs August through October. The moths are typically one half inch to three quarters of an inch long as adults and have snout like projections on their heads. The moth will lay eggs that hatch in seven to ten days. The larvae (caterpillar) can get to one inch long and are light green with dark spots on their body. The damage can be destructive and early detection is a big advantage.

To inspect for sod webworms look closely at the lawn for heavy chewing damage on the leaf blade of the grass. Evidence of caterpillar's activity include chewing on the leaf edge, stripping grass clipping, and possibly green excrement pellets. Additionally, the worms leave trails of silky web, best spotted when dew is on the ground. Bird feeding in worm infested area can also be a sign.

Another way to see whether or not you have caterpillar is to use lemon scented soapy water. Mix, one ounce of lemon scented liquid soap per gallon of water. Pour the soapy water over the green grass right at the edge of the dying grass. The tropical web worm is easier to spot wiggling from the irritating lemon scented soap.

Lawns damaged can recover, however, the later in the season the damage happens, the less recovery you will see before winter dormancy. If the lawn was healthy before the larvae damage, the more likely it will recover.

If the sod webworm is detected consider using any of the listed insecticides.

Spinosad – an organic insecticide.

Bifenthrin – sold as Talstar, Ortho Home Defense and other brands.

Acephate – a systemic material, also Orthene and other brands.

Carbaryl – sold as Sevin.

All are effective and readily available. Follow the label directions on all pesticides.

The tropical webworm can be severe blow to our summer lawns. Early awareness and action can limit their activity.

Southwest Louisiana Master Gardeners Host 12th State Master Gardener Conference

Space is still available for the 2012 state master gardener conference October 24-26 at L'auberge Casino Resort in Lake Charles, LA. As space is limited, interested persons are encouraged to register as soon as possible. More detailed information about the conference is available at www.lsuagcenter.com/lmg2012.

The three day conference features prominent speakers in the field of horticulture. There will also be a variety of vendors and a location that cannot be beat.

“We wanted this event to highlight outstanding writers and speakers in gardening,” said Emily Shirley, chairperson of the event. “Examples of our outstanding speakers include Nellie Neal and Dr. Allan Armitage,” she said. Nellie Neal’s books include “Questions and Answers for Deep South Gardeners” and “Getting Started in Southern Gardening.” Dr. Armitage is a noted writer and horticulturist. He teaches at the University of Georgia where he runs the research gardens. Margaret Place tour is one of three offered at the conclusion of the conference; another is a high tea at the Nobless Tea House on Ryan Street in Lake Charles. A tour is also scheduled to the famed Creole Nature Trail in Cameron Parish, south of Lake Charles.





HANGING GARDENS

Here are a couple of photos of my newest "creation." It's a hanging shoe bag filled with herbs and lettuces. It was very easy to make. The hard part was finding a shoe bag like this one. Most shoe bags are the kind where shoes go in horizontally and of course, that won't work. You also wouldn't want one made of clear plastic as that might absorb too much heat. I found this canvas one online at Wal-Mart and it works perfectly. I decided to put a grommet in the bottom of each slot, so water could drain easily. I filled each slot with a mixture of Miracle Grow Potting Soil and soil polymers to keep it moist.

This is perfect for someone who lives in an apartment or condo and has very little space for a garden. Mine is conveniently located near my kitchen and barbecue grill. You may notice I've attached a pair of scissors, so I have easy access to snipping a few herbs whenever I need them. I've also left a few slots open for more lettuces when the weather cools.

EX FIVE SPORTS DRINK

If you're reading this, chances are you are an avid gardener. I love working outside in my yard even if it's pulling weeds. But I have a bad habit of going out in the noonday sun and in the summer months, I don't perspire or glisten, I SWEAT!! In the past I have suffered with leg cramps because I'm losing valuable electrolytes when I sweat. But I have found a new product and it really helps.

It's called EX5 and it's similar to Powerade and Gatorade except it has fewer calories and less sugar. It was developed by a Covington man, Brian Brothers, in conjunction with the LSUAg people. It turns out that Brian became interested in developing this product while watching a Saints game. He noticed that a player was suffering from dehydration when he had been drinking Gatorade throughout the game. Even though the player had been rehydrating, it wasn't enough to keep him going.

While Brian was trying to come up with something better, a professor of Food Science at LSU, John Finley, was working on a formula to mask the bitterness in foods. His research discovered a chemical compound from the monk fruit which blocks bitter tastes.

It turns out that potassium, magnesium and calcium are essential elements that the body loses in sweat, but try to replace them in an energy drink and they taste bitter. Gatorade and PowerAde leave these minerals out of their drinks or mask the taste with lots of sugar.

Soon Brian and Finley were working together to develop a sports drink that would include essential electrolytes, taste good, and not be loaded with sugar. And voila, EX Five was created. Right now there are only 2 flavors – lemon/lime and fruit punch – but they're working on creating others.

So if you're having trouble maintaining those valuable electrolytes, I strongly recommend this product. Not only is it local, but the LSU AgCenter department will receive royalties from the sale of it. A Win-Win for everybody!

September 2012 Butterfly Garden Update

The Lacombe butterfly garden really starts coming alive as fall approaches. Lots of our plants are in bloom including sedum, Turk's cap, "bat face" cuphea, cigar plant, and the very colorful penta. In addition we usually start seeing some color on our fall asters. We also see more butterfly activity, and several have been seen fluttering around our blooming passion vine, milkweed and lantana. Generous rains this summer have contributed to healthy and happy plants.

As October approaches the Butterfly Garden Committee has made plans for the 2012 WILD THINGS, an annual family event hosted by the US Fish and Wildlife Service and The Friends of Louisiana Wildlife Refuges, Inc. This action-packed day will be held at the 110-acre Bayou Lacombe Centre in Lacombe, LA from 10am to 5pm on Saturday, October 13. Master Gardeners will be on site at our garden throughout the day to provide an insight into butterflies and their habitats. We will focus on butterfly anatomy this year, and plans include a day-long release of Painted Lady butterflies and educational activities for our visitors. Last year over 900 adults and children stopped by our garden, and were one of the most popular activities at WILD THINGS.

In preparation for the event we will get together at 9:00 AM on Thursday, October 4 so that we can spruce up the garden and add some fall bedding plants. If you would like to join us please feel free to come; we will probably work about two hours. Bring your hand tools and water bottles.

We will be in need of volunteers to help at our garden on the day of WILD THINGS. Volunteers will work in two-hour shifts beginning at 9:15 and ending by 5:15, and will assist children with hands-on educational activities and lead tours of the garden for visitors. This is a great opportunity to get some volunteer hours at a very fun and interesting event. AUGUST GENERAL MEETING 2012 ST TAMMANY PARISH MASTER GARDENERS

The August general membership meeting of the STPMG was held on 8/15/12 at the National Guard Armory in Covington. Sixty members were in attendance. The meeting was called to order by President Julie Deus at 10:02 a.m. Julie led in the pledge of allegiance and Rusty gave the opening prayer.

Judy Wood gave the garden hint of saving the plastic bag from the Times-Picayune paper. You can wear it as a long glove for grabbing poison ivy then turning it inside out, tying it up, and discarding it without ever touching with your hands or even your good gloves. Kathleen had a hint to spread a line of children's colored sand down the row of recently planted tiny seeds so that the wind doesn't blow them away or birds eat them. They will sprout right through the sand and you won't have to remember where you planted them in the meantime.

Rusty discussed the garden problem for this month—air-born Cercospora on your Hydrangeas. He said a fungicide would correct it but it could also clear up on its own as the seasons change. Water getting on the bottom leaves usually causes the disease to spread. He stressed the importance of keeping the garden clear of fallen leaves and debris.

Diane Quinn gave a wonderful presentation on aquatic gardens. She showed slides of beautiful gardens and explained how we could have one of our own. Diane explained how we could build one in a sugar kettle, as she did, or use one of the preformed liners available, or design your own using sheets of plastic liners. The four things you must have for a great aquatic garden are a pump, a filter, an aerator, and a UV sterilizer. She suggested numerous plants to use and what type and how many fish to buy. We ended up all wanting to go home and build an aquatic garden.

Rusty spoke on his recent travels including the National County agent meeting in North Carolina. While there he took a tour of a mushroom "farm" operated by monks. He said although the methods seemed primitive, the results were spectacular. He also mentioned problems people were having with their lawns, including Spurge (weed) and Sod Webworm.

Nancy Berulis motioned we accept the July minutes as presented. Eileen Gremillion seconded. Motion carried.

Ty Guidroz motioned we accept the treasurer's report as submitted. Susie Koepf seconded. Motion carried.

Ty reported on the March Plant show plans. He said there are a lot of new ideas to discuss and some new chairs have been set-up. Mark Flynn will be in charge of recycling and Rodney cross in charge of 'set up & take down'. Also this year there will be an ATM machine on site. The first meeting will be in October to organize.

Jerry Ballanco reported on the Vegucator Seminars on Wednesdays at the AgCenter at 9:00 a.m. Martha Gruning reported on the Abita Library. The first planning meeting for the new gardens there will be the end of August. Betty Rose announced a Sept. 5th meeting at the Slidell Library, 1:00 p.m. with a topic of edible ginger.

Meeting adjourned at 11:49 a.m.
