### Nancy Bartlett of Blue Stem Farms

At the July meeting, our featured speaker was Nancy Bartlett of Blue Stem Farms from Folsom, part of Bartlett Farms. Nancy is a member of the Association of Specialty Cut Flower Growers. She and her son, John, are regulars at the Saturday Covington Farmer's Market and the Crescent City Farmer's Market in New Orleans. Nancy sells cut flowers from Blue Stem Farms and John, "The Garden" part of Bartlett Farms, sells organic vegetables and fresh eggs. John was recently featured in *Gambit* magazine.

John does the manual part of the flower growing, preparing the soil and making rows. Nancy grows her flowers from seed in a greenhouse then moves them outside. She uses grid support netting that is raised as the plants grow taller. She also uses hoop houses to extend the growing season. The grid netting and the diffused light from the hoop house allows for tall straight stems necessary for cut flowers. Nancy talked about the timing of cutting flowers for the longest lasting cut flowers which varies for each type of flower. For example, zinnias are cut before pollen forms. # Fungus Among Us

Our lawns have taken a tremulous “stomping” this year. In January through February we had below freezing days in addition to snow, followed by consistent cool weather from March to mid-May. Then sooner than you can say “Hotter than Hades,” we had a stretch of 90° and drought.

Now that the continued hot August nights and high humidity are here we can expect several fungi problems in the lawns. Begin looking for these common lawn diseases.

- Take-all Root Rot – this is currently the most common disease in our lawns this summer. The disease resembles brown patch. The patches for take-all are more irregular in shape than those of brown patch. Because it is a root disease, it actually kills the turf, whereas brown patch only kills the leaves. A key symptom of take-all root rot is the ease of lifting the damaged material from the soil. Reduce the stress, proper irrigation, proper cutting heights, and avoiding high nitrogen fertilizer can minimize the disease.
- Brown Patch - common in most grasses but especially in Bermuda, Centipede and St. Augustine. The symptoms appear in a wide circular pattern usually brownish to gray. High Nitrogen, deep thatch and watering in late afternoon are problems that can cause this fungus to increase. Brown patch will occasionally show up this time of year, but is more likely to become a problem in the fall beginning in late September as the temperatures cool down. Best time for brown patch is when daytime temperatures are less than 85° and nights are above 50°.
- Gray Leaf Spot – mostly found on St. Augustine. Common with long period of hot, humid weather. Lesions of gray leaf spot are more tan to gray and margins are more purplish-brown. From a distance the affected areas may have the dirty yellow appearance. Often times found in shaded damp areas of the lawn.

Our lawns are struggling and these are some things we can do to help. Cutting height, cutting frequency, thatch layer and soil compaction are simple corrections to limit fungus among us. ## AGAPANTHUS

Most lilies are enjoyable for a few days, while the agapanthus or Lily of the Nile gives us pleasure for nearly the whole month of June. The cooling shades of blue, purple or white give our gardens a fresh look when the heat is on!

My agapanthus stay with me all year. I pick the stalks and let them dry naturally in a crock or tall container. The soft brown texture adds interest in any room. When they are dry, I pick off the seed pods and flower debris, and they are ready for a new experience.



The dry stalks can be used naturally in fall arrangements, spray painted shiny red for a Christmas look or even gilded silver and gold for New Year's Eve!

This spring my Lily of the Nile crop was perfect in a door wreath. A quick spray of Rustoleum satin "Sweet Pea" pink put the finishing touch on my summer wreath.

Take the plunge and make your Lily of the Nile a constant companion!

## PLUMERIA

It was summer 2006, and we had just said grace over a meal with our pre-Katrina neighbors. The phone rang; friends from Algiers were bringing us some plants. I suggested that I'd pick them up next time I was in New Orleans, but that didn't work. The plants were in the car, and they were on their way!



When they arrived, they were embarrassed to barge in on a Sunday dinner party, but we convinced them to sit down and enjoy the meal. Fortunately, we had more than enough.

The two plants were plumerias---more than 5 feet tall! I knew that this was the Hawaiian lei flower, but that was the extent of it. They told us to put the plants inside during the winter months. We kept them alive for a few years with poor results.

Then one day, I saw the Plumeria booth at the St. Tammany Master Gardener Plant sale. The vendor said to put them in FULL SUN (of course, they had been in the shade) and feed them plumeria food. I have to tell you, these plants just bloomed like crazy by following her advice.

Now they are a pleasure and a show-stopper too!

So if you have plumerias at your house, give them as much sun as possible along with a time-release fertilizer that promotes blooms. It will make all the difference.

A meeting of the St. Tammany Parish Master Gardener Association was held on Wednesday, July 20, 2011 at 10:00 AM at the National Guard Armory.

Julie Deus called the meeting to order. A quorum was present with 61 members attending. Julie led the members in the Pledge of Allegiance and Rusty Batty led the group in prayer.

Judy Wood introduced Art Scott who presented the Hot Topic, "Sanitation and Bugs". Don LeFevre followed with "Frugal Hints" for the garden.

Nancy Bartlett of Bartlett Farms, member of the Association of Specialty Cut Flower Growers, spoke to the members on "Flower Growing for Cutting". Nancy sells flowers at the Covington Farmers Market and Crescent City Farmers Market in New Orleans.

(10 minute break following the speaker program)

Rusty Batty reported that the new Master Gardener class starts August 16<sup>th</sup> with 30 people (there were 69 applicants). Rusty also gave an update on the budget cuts.

Julie asked for approval of the June minutes.

A Motion was offered by Nancy Berulis to approve the June, 2011 minutes as presented. Motion carried.

Julie thanked the members who responded to the survey and stated that at the next meeting, there would be discussion and voting on a possible change in the Plant Sale dates. Pam Twardzik will continue accepting surveys for an extended time.

A Motion was offered by Linda Deslatte to approve Master Gardener's support of the Fall Seminar. Motion carried.

Betty Rose announced that the Fall Herb Fest would be chaired by Camille Schwandt and the first planning meeting would be on July 29<sup>th</sup> at 2:30 PM at the Passionate Platter in Slidell.

A Motion was offered by Judy Wood to approve Master Gardener's support of the Fall Herb Fest. Motion carried.

Betty reminded everyone that the next Herb Talk would be on August 10<sup>th</sup> at the Slidell Library – Pattie McGinnis will speak on basil and on October 5<sup>th</sup>, Cecelia Drennan will talk about mint. Tastings follow the presentations. Additional information will be in the Garden-goer.

Christy Paulsell gave an update on the partnership with the St. Tammany Parish School System and Northshore Community Foundation (Jinx Vidrine). The Summer Institute professional development program will be on July 27 at the Jefferson East Center. Dr. Kiki Fontenot will participate and Christy asked for Master Gardener participation, input, support in this endeavor.

Donna Howland reported on the Food Bank project and stated there would be a meeting on Friday, July 22 at 10:00 AM at the Ag Center. Planning will begin for a fall group and Donna invited those interested in participating to attend.

Door prizes were awarded to #1, Pete Pericone and #41, Dennis Koepp.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:55 AM.

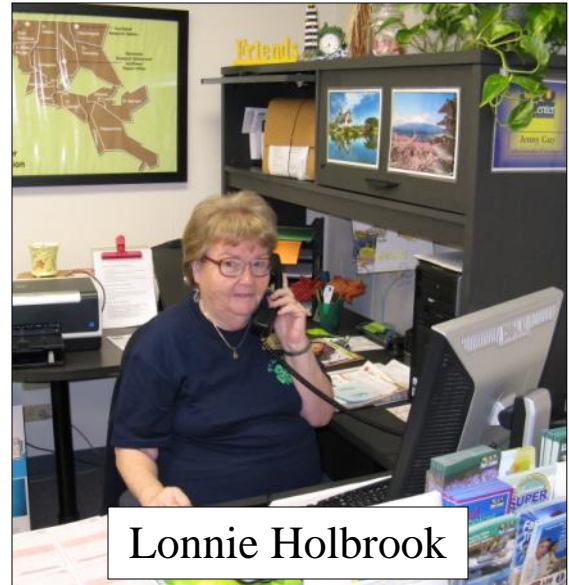

Since it survived the winter freeze in a pot I am tempted to plant it in the ground but would like to learn more about it first. Can anyone identify this plant?

SOLVED**

**Scientific name: *Amorphophallus konjac* (sold as *Amorphophallus rivieri*)**

**Common names: Devils tongue, Snake plant, Voodoo lily, Dragon plant, etc.**

**A native of Asia, especially China and Korea, it is in Araceae, Arum Family, along with Jack in the Pulpit, Arum, Calla lily, Caladium, etc.**

**It grows from a tuber which was probably left in the pot after the plant froze down.**
