Ground Cover to Consider

Many homeowners want greenery whenever and wherever they can get it. That's not usually a problem except where there is limited light, steep terrain or inadequate moisture. The best choice of plant material for such an area is ground cover.


Ground covers are generally any low growing plants (other than grass) that cover a large area. They can help reduce erosion, are tolerant of most insects/ diseases, and generally low maintenance, such as mowing, weeding, or feeding. They are a great choice in providing greenery and some color in otherwise difficult areas.

Some ground cover recommendations to consider include:

For Shade to partial Shade: Choose from liriopse (various varieties of *Liriope muscari*), creeping lily turf (*Liriope spicata*), monkey grass (*Ophiopogon japonicus*), Asian jasmine (*Trachelospermum asiaticum*), cast iron plant (*Aspidistra elatior*), English ivy (*Hedera helix*), Algerian ivy (*Hedera canariensis*), periwinkle (*Vinca major*, an excellent variegated form is available), ajuga (*Ajuga reptans*, use in small areas, since it is prone to crown rot), strawberry begonia (*Saxifraga stolonifera*), many ferns such as holly fern (*Cyrtomium falcatum*), wood fern (*Thelypteris kunthii*), sword fern (*Nephrolepis cordifolia*) and autumn fern (*Dryopteris erythrosora*), to name a few.

For Partial Shade / Sun to Sun: Consider Lily-of-the-Nile (*Agapanthus*), sedum (*Sedum acre*, *S. Album*), low-growing junipers (*Juniperus chinensis procumbens* and *J. horizontalis* cultivars especially), dwarf lantanas, dwarf bamboo (*Arundinaria pygmaea*), daylily (*Hemerocallis*), wedelia (*Wedelia trilobata*, south Louisiana), perennial verbenas and yarrow (*Achillea millefolium*).

Using ground cover can offer a solution to a wide variety of limited landscapes.



Hi Everyone,

As I sit at the kitchen table I see the most beautiful pink cloud outside the window. It is a Taiwan cherry and it is spectacular this year thanks to the mild, adequately moist winter. This isn't enough for a column, so I stroll down to the veggie garden to find some broccoli, leaf lettuces, and a column topic. I am never disappointed by my little produce patch. I round the driveway to see several robins dashing and jumping in the pathways of the garden. They are parading through the dense, lush, spreading, perennial commonly known as chickweed. If I had to pick a favorite garden weed, it indeed would be "Stellaria media." Its stellar qualities include: it is found throughout the entire United States. It is Eurasian in origin. According to Weeds of the South, edited by DeFelice and Bryson, the seedlings are slender, often reddish, trichomes few, with unequal, clear cotyledons. It is 8-10 inches tall with a prostrate habit and a weak taproot that makes it easy to remove. Its tiny white flowers mature into seed capsules with multiple seeds insuring your garden of repeat performances spring after spring. February is a brown month generally in my yard, so I welcome the color reluctantly. Common chickweed also has an upscale cousin known as Mouse Eared Chickweed. Both are in the Caryophyllaceae or Pink family. It has the same basic characteristics as its cousin but its leaves are tufted and resemble mouse ears. This is the decorator model. It is also found throughout the United States. Armed with this knowledge and a 15 gallon black tub I proceed to thin the population. I stop and drop a bucket full to the cows who devour every last bit before I can finish dumping the bucket. The robins are now scratching frantically to unearth the newly exposed bugs in the pathways. I refill the tub and proceed to the chicken pen. They too like chick weed! Finally, the rabbits are the last to enjoy the impromptu feast. All the critters like chickweed. There are no toxic properties reported so I wash a handful and much to my disappointment, although the texture is crunchy, it still tastes like grass. So while everything is still slow in the garden go out and enjoy selecting your favorite weed. PS. I just bought a planket to protect my lettuces, more to follow next month. Back in the garden with the birds, aj

Report of Bylaws Committee, January 18, 2012:

By direction of the bylaws committee, I move the following revision of the bylaws; the addition of Sections 11 and 12 to Article VIII. Committees.

Section 11. Committee chairs will be appointed by the president with board approval. The terms of the committee chairs will be for one year. A Master Gardener may be reappointed chair for a second year. The term of a committee chair may not exceed 2 consecutive years. The term committee is as delineated in Sections 1 through 8 under Article VIII.

Section 12. Each committee chair will appoint a co-chair to assume committee responsibilities in the absence of the chair.

Background:

A suggestion was made by an MG to have a term limit for chairing a committee.

The Board deemed the suggestion worthy of being brought to the membership for a vote.

This change would require an amendment to the bylaws, so the Board requested the bylaws committee convene to draft appropriate language that would reflect the intent of the suggestion.

Even though not everyone on the bylaws committee is in favor the idea, the group developed proposed amendments to the bylaws.

The proposed amendments will provide an orderly method for discussion of the suggestion and ability to arrive at an accurate consensus of opinion. This discussion will take place at the February MG meeting.

At the end of the discussion a ballot vote will be taken resulting in an approved amendment or one which was defeated.

Kappy Goodwin motioned to accept the December minutes as submitted. Susie Koepp seconded. Motion carried.

Under new business Pam Twardzik read a proposed change in our by-laws which would limit a member to a two year term as chairman of a committee. Discussion will begin at the February meeting.

Martha Gruning announced a beautification project at the Abita Springs library. A motion was made by Chere Hall and seconded by Rod Downie that we accept this project. Motion carried.

Jay Rose announced that, at present, we have 138 paid Master Gardeners. David Lynd motioned to accept the treasurer’s report as submitted, seconded by Betty Rose. Motion carried.

A.J. spoke on the progress of the March Plant Show. This will be the 12th year for the show. Billie Stanga reported on the upcoming seminar “It’s Easy Being Green” and Ann Durel reported on the Otis House Butterfly garden.

A meeting of the Board of Directors of the St. Tammany Parish Master Gardeners Association was held on Thursday 1/19/12, at 1:00 p.m.. In attendance were Julie Deus, Judy Wood, Jay Rose, Kathleen Guidry and Debora Litzenberger. This was the first board meeting held at the new Slidell location, City Hall, 2055 Second Street. All members are invited to attend.

Julie called the meeting to order and Jay went over the projected expenses and income that make up the 2012 budget and the final ledger entries for the 2011 year. Net worth in checking and savings combined, as of 12/31/11, was \$20,716.79.

Judy gave updates on programs and trips already in the works for this coming year including the Veggies in June and a possible presenter for ginger in July. A field trip is planned for October to Bracey's and the lunch for that event will be \$17.00.
