Home Care for Holiday Plants

The poinsettia, Christmas cactus and Kalanchoe add festive air to holiday decorations. Unfortunately, these plants don't last as long as we would like. Proper care once they are in the home will keep them looking attractive for a long time.

In general, be sure to protect the plants when bringing them home. Sudden exposure to low temperatures and wind will damage the plants. These plants are usually sold wrapped in foil. To allow proper drainage, punch holes in the foil where the drainage holes of the pot are located and set the plant in a plastic saucer. Often the plants are root bound and will require frequent (daily) watering to just moisten the soil. Be sure that you don't overwater which will cause root rot.

These plants appreciate being set in a brightly lit location – but not direct sunlight that can burn the plant. Some morning sun is beneficial but not essential during the holiday season. If you are interested in growing the plant beyond the Christmas season, it is important for it to receive adequate light after you are finished displaying it.

If the plant drops its leaves or flowers, this could be caused by low temperatures below 70 F, drafts or low humidity. Any of these conditions will shorten the attractive life of a holiday plant and should be avoided.

Poinsettias

With proper care, poinsettias may be grown and enjoyed for many years. In March, cut the plant back to 6 – 12 inches and put it in a sunny location. To produce a bushier plant with more flowers, cut the plant back again in July. Do not cut it back after September 1.

Poinsettias form flowers when nights are long. To set flowers, they must not receive artificial light at night after September 1. If the plant is growing in a container, move it to a dark closet between 5:00 pm and 8:00 am every night after September 1. It must be moved back to a sunny window in the morning.

Christmas Cactus

If your Christmas cactus begins to drop buds when you bring it home, there is little that you can do. These plants do not like to be moved while blooming. Hopefully a few blooms will hang on and make a beautiful display.

The good news is that this plant is an easily grown house plant that can be displayed at home for many years. When the initial blooms have dropped off, reduce watering and keep the plant in a well-lit location. It can also be moved to a shaded porch during the summer. The plant should be kept evenly moist and fertilized with a half strength fertilizer once a month.

To induce flowers, the amount of water should be decreased in October and the plant placed outside or in an unheated room. Low temperatures in the 50's and long nights are necessary for blooms. When tiny buds appear, move the plant inside to a bright location and leave it there. Keep it evenly moist but not soggy and mist it if the humidity is low.

Kalanchoe

These plants enjoy a sunny window in the home. They will tolerate less light for a short season but will do best with bright light.

These plants are succulents and will rot if the soil is kept too moist. Make sure the soil feels dry before watering and never allow the pot to sit in water. When your kalanchoe outgrows its original pot, move it to one an inch larger in diameter and re-pot with a gritty, well drained mix.

Like the poinsettias, kalanchoes are triggered to bloom by long nights and short days in the fall. The plants will not bloom unless they receive similar treatment.

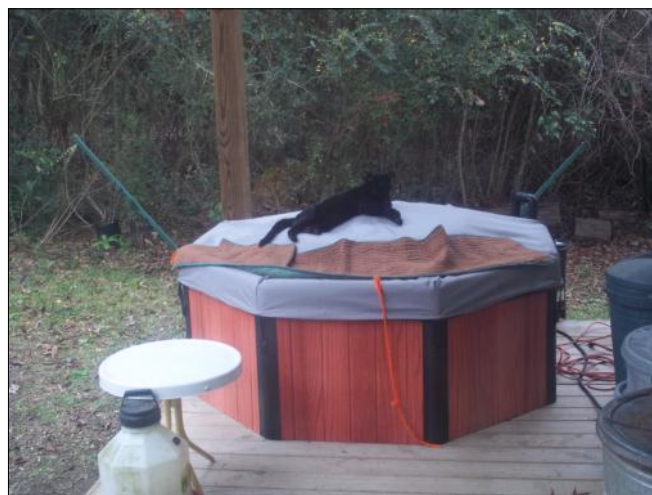
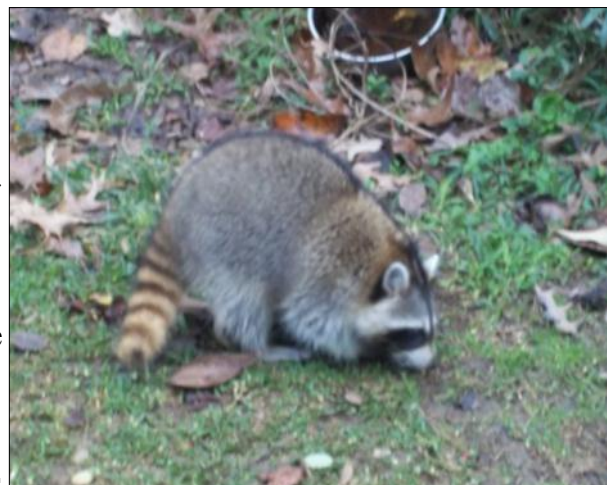

Susie Andres, President

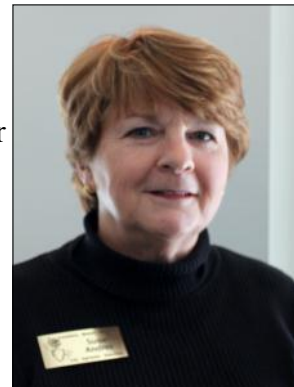

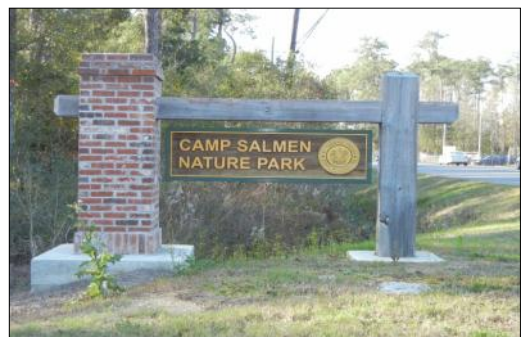
Camp Salmen Nature Park Hummingbird/Butterfly Garden

The Camp Salmen Hummingbird/Butterfly Garden is a new project for the St. Tammany Parish Master Gardeners. Located on scenic Bayou Liberty near Slidell, Camp Salmen, for nearly 60 years, was the regional camp reservation for the Greater New Orleans area Boy Scouts. St. Tammany Parish purchased Camp Salmen in 2004 and opened it to the public as the Camp Salmen Nature Park a few years ago.

Camp Salmen Nature Park is a rich ecological endowment of native landscapes and an unusually diverse community of plants and animals. The Park reached out to the St. Tammany Parish Master Gardeners to partner with them to create a Hummingbird/Butterfly Garden. The garden is located in an area called "Order of the Arrow" just off the main parking lot. Our plan is to use plants native to the region in a natural setting. Once the garden is established it will serve to educate the community and help increase the horticultural knowledge of the residents. The garden will be available to schools, scouts, and other organizations and we will participate at the Park's Spring Fling and Youth Wetlands Day (in the fall) much like the Wild Things event held at the SELA National Wildlife Refuge in Lacombe every year.
